Immanuel: "When I was small I didn't even like to touch the school campus. After some years, I don't like to go out of the school because everyday I learn new things. And we share new things with others. All these things make me a wonderful man."

Darshan: "I joined Aikiyam School in 1st Standard. In some schools when we join as a new student we didn't

get friends but my friends became really close to me when I joined here."

Parthiban: "From Creche to 5th Standard I love to go to the library because if we read a book they will stick a sticker."

Shanmugapriya: "I like Roy very much because whenever he passed by our house he gave chocolate to me and my sister. Now that we wear uniforms I feel we are one family."

Manjula: "Here we have many options. I learnt dance, song and embroidery. I will miss

MISSION STATEMENT OF AIKIYAM SCHOOL (NCBS)

Aikiyam School strives to nurture and prepare Tamil village children for life in our rapidly changing world, while maintaining contact with their Tamil language and cultural heritage, through the principles of Integral Education established by Sri Aurobindo and The Mother, Founder of Auroville, and the English medium CBSE curriculum.

Ranjith: "When I joined Aikiyam in 4th Standard I did not have English knowledge. We did a project called solar system. It made me very happy because it was my first English project."

Surendar: "This year our class learned about film and we made a small movie. I am really lucky to study in this school."

All these students feel confident that they can speak and read English. The highlight of this year was the two week drama project of Romeo and Juliet. Each of the students took part to write and act in the drama. They will never forget this wonderful experience which was led by Pips, a volunteer English teacher from South Africa.

Aikiyam Art Exhibition

One day in February the Aikiyam dining hall became a patchwork of bright colors, with every square inch of space displaying pieces of art. Posters, murals and masks swayed in the Kulilapalayam breeze, while lunch tables were covered with exquisite mandalas and detailed graphite self-portraits. Art teacher Ramalingam and Deborah Howland-Murray, a US volunteer art teacher, put together this show of student work which was the result of a two month collaborative project.

Deborah learned that, "Traditional Indian art reflects its people's profound respect for precision and perfection, vivid color and symmetrical design. This was evident in the children's drawings, which were very beautiful and conceptually literal, but not as free, individual and expressive as American children's art. Their work was also shaped by a scarcity of materials. Scarcity makes each piece of paper and each stub of pencil seem so precious that it becomes problematic for them to risk mistakes. Realizing this, I had found my niche.

I needn't mirror Ramalingam's fine technical instruction, but by virtue of my more free-wheeling American background and the supplies I provided, I could help them explore making art with increased self-expression." For Deborah, "The later projects like self-portraits provided a good barometer of how these open, trusting children had taken risks and grown. Students struggled to abandon outlines and realistically create the light and shadow they saw in their personal photographs. The art room was uncharacteristically silent as they worked."

The exhibit was the joyous celebration of some hard won victories on the part of nearly two hundred

children and two teachers who care about them.

Inauguration of Our New Building



Decorated Building,

There was great excitement at Aikiyam School on the evening of March 9th, as students and teachers gaily decorated our new building, which houses a library, science lab, and two classrooms. Colourful sarees were draped along the walls, beautiful kolams were drawn, and traditional oil lamps put in place. The next morning the students and teachers returned with fresh flowers to complete their work. Most of the funds for the new building came from the German Government, via AVI Germany.

At 11:00 on March 10th, Mrs. Christiane Cranshaw-Wachholtz, the German Consul from Chennai cut the ribbon and the building was officially opened. This was followed by friends of Aikiyam lighting a 5 feet tall 'Kuttu Vilakku' or oil lamp. There were speeches by Mrs Cranshaw, Devasmita, and Shankar, and then Aikiyam children entertained everyone with classical dances and songs. Refreshments followed.

Waste Waste (Kuppai, kuppai)

...it is everywhere, says Lea, a German volunteer. Masses of it sprawled over the Indian landscape, overtaking villages. One cannot even avoid seeing piles of it covering the green space between the main road and Aikiyam School.

Many efforts have been made to improve the devastating situation in terms of solid waste and its management in the area. Right now some amounts of organic waste get composted, fed to animals or left to rot in pits in backyards. But the vast majority of all waste generated day by day is openly burned or simply dumped onto the land. This was one of the most shocking lessons I learned when I came to India.

Out of my experiences with the Litter-Free Auroville Campaign in January, the idea of an education program on waste was born. Yes, I knew all about separation and I could tell for how much a certain plastic would sell; but how would that help me? I wanted people from Kuilapalayam to realize the value of waste and at the same time realize the danger of all non-valuable waste such as cheap plastic bags floating around everywhere. I had seen enough children repeating

fearfully "we should not use plastic. Plastic is bad" and buying vegetables in cheap plastic bags the minute after.

At this point Shankar luckily agreed to support and help me with the development of a program, which was finally tried out with 6th and 7th grades during the month of March.

Five sessions on different topics were held. Children applied what they learned in the five sessions and separated Aikiyam School's waste. A new place for the storage of separated waste in different barrels was set up. Four students Priyanka, Nirosha, Iyappan and Priya were given the title of 'Waste Officer' and would follow up the correct separation of the school's waste. The finale of the program were visits to the Pondicherry dump site and later to a model segregation place in Pondicherry, guided by Neranjan from Eco Pro, Auroville.

Personally I enjoyed the program so much. I felt grateful especially during the moments of sharing reality I had with the kids and to see how they showed honesty by admitting the challenge of doing ANYTHING against the practice of burning waste at home. The program I put together included many games, stories and exercises with bits and pieces of Tamil – my strategy to let learning be fun and be able to receive the kids' full attention. For many children waste is a rather boring topic. I look at it the opposite way: we can be detectives to find out where it comes from and where it goes. We can be artists finding creative ways to REUSE things.

And in the end it is all about small steps: avoid mixing of inorganic with organic waste, start composting, taking cloth bags to the store, stop buying things in small packets (for a rupee or two), washing empty milk packets and selling them off, collecting newspaper etc.

I am full of hope that the children of Aikiyam will try to do their part towards a less littered village.
