Aikiyam students go to camp in Kodaikanal, Tamil Nadu

This year Aikiyam sent its seventeen 7th graders to the Auroville 'Nature Camp' at Kavunji, Kodaikanal. The camp organizers mixed all Auroville and Auroville Outreach school children together and divided them into 3 groups under teams of camp leaders. Each group stayed at Kavunji for 8 days and nights and participated in a variety of activities. This educational activity brought together the children of Auroville and those of its surrounding villages for a collective experience of nature in the forest. Each camp offered a range of experiences designed to introduce the children to the flora and fauna of the area, to increase their environmental awareness, to awaken the spirit of adventure through treks and climbs, and to deepen their relation to and appreciation of nature. For many children, this was the first time apart from their families, and away on an adventure with others of their age group.

I am Swapna [pictured with students], a Social Science teacher at Aikiyam school. This was my first time to visit the Nainital camp in the North of India. Actually it was a wonderful experience for me with our 8th graders. For some of the children, it was their first long-term outing experience away from home. They eagerly waited to see the train pass through the tunnels and they had fun when they were inside the tunnels by shouting. They helped each other to lift their bags. We all had a good time in Nainital. The climatic condition was new for them so it took some time to get used to it; they all enjoyed walking in the chilly weather. Everything was new for them like the North Indian food, the different way the local people dressed, and the language they spoke. After a while some of our students learnt some Hindi words from the Delhi school children and they in turn learnt some Tamil words. I felt like some kind of exchange took place in learning between students of two cultures, and English was the medium for sharing these languages. Our students also learnt about the normal peoples' life by observing their life struggles for basic needs like food, water and other things, which is not unlike their own background. For some children it was a new experience to purchase things on their own in the absence of their parents and so they came to better understand the value of money and its difficulties. The Metro train system was totally new for me as well as the students; it was exciting and challenging. They were the happiest moments for all, each and every minute we spent there.

Aikiyam School strives to nurture and prepare Tamil village children for life in our rapidly changing world, while maintaining contact with their Tamil language and cultural heritage, through the principles of Integral Education established by Sri Aurobindo and The Mother, Founder of Auroville, and the English medium CBSE curriculum.



At Aikiyam School we understand that ultimately everything is a grace, and our trust in receiving what is needed to daily offer the children a quality education is great. We know very well from years of experience that we're able to continue our work because of donations received from you, our friends, past and current volunteers, Auroville International Centres from around the world, as well as fellow Aurovilians. By now you likely know that Aikiyam School receives about 50% of its annual running budget from Auroville via the Sri Aurobindo International Institute of Educational Research (SAIER). Generally, the other half flows together through you. On a monthly basis we need an additional Rs. 800 (€13; \$18) per child to run

the school. Kitchen renovation

for the very generous specified donation of a long-time well-wisher of Aikiyam School. The next biggest challenge has been the timing. Ideally the work would be done, or just about, before the students return to class at the beginning of July. Renovation began around mid-April, even though we had tried for the first of the month. The initial stage of any renovation, of course, is destruction, and what a noise that made! By now the reconstruction phase is in full swing and the work more quiet. We hope you will share in our excitement with these photos ... and imagine the children singing, dancing and exploring their inner-self in this new space.

You may remember that we finished our new kitchen in 2008. The beautiful airy dining space, which is enjoyed for most of the year, gets really wet when we have rain and wind at the same time. After discussing the matter with our architect, we decided that the solution for keeping dry was to lower the roof and increase the overhang. As it was not possible to increase the overhang of the existing sheet-metal roof, we decided to make a cement roof, and use the old roofing material for a second floor. This would provide a perfect place where performing arts such as drama, dance, and musical-instrument playing, as well as Awareness Through the Body sessions could be offered.
